Fulbright Scholarships

There are over 140 countries participating in the Fulbright programs this year. If you've submitted an "Intent to Apply" with UC San Diego, your internal application is due this fall.

Deadline: September 9, 2018

DAAD Research Fellowship

Opportunity to conduct short term research (1-6 months) or long term research (7-10 months) in Germany.

Deadline: October 1, 2018

Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowship

Supports New Americans, immigrants, or the children of immigrants, who are pursuing graduate school in the U.S.

Deadline: November 1, 2018

AAUW Fellowship

Support for women pursuing full-time graduate or postdoctoral study in the U.S. who are not U.S. citizen or permanent residents.

Deadline: November 15, 2018

PEO International Scholarship

Provides scholarships for selected women from other countries for graduate study in the U.S. and Canada. Open September 15th.

INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH SPOTLIGHT



The Vernet Lab

Dr. Maria Vernet is a phytoplankton ecologist, studying the importance of phytoplankton in food webs and ecosystems. In particular, her lab studies phytoplankton in its most extreme environment, the polar regions. This work is inherently international, and the lab partners with researchers in Chile, Argentina, Norway, Germany, and more.

Dr. Vernet and her graduate students are frequent visitors to Antarctica, where they measure phytoplankton abundance in fjords. Graduate student Jack Pan uses satellites to look at the biological and optical properties in the ocean, specifically of glacial meltwater in Antarctica. Second year grad student Allison Lee has helped to launch FjordPhyto, a citizen science program that calls on tourists visiting Antarctica to collect phytoplankton samples, which she later analyzes in the lab. This will help the Vernet Lab determine how melting glaciers are affecting phytoplankton abundance, and more broadly, ecosystem interactions. Both Lee and Vernet spent the summer at Friday Harbor Labs in the San Juan Islands, where Vernet taught a course, Fjord Ecosystems and Climate Change, with Dr. Craig Smith (University of Hawaii). The course drew international students and lecturers from Canada, Spain, Chile, Argentina, Brazil, Germany, Sweden, and Switzerland. Students participated in lectures, lab exercises and field trips to understand key ecological drivers in temperate and polar fjords.
